


CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

During the past 12 months the South West Volleyball Association has in some aspects moved forward, in others it has stood still. There have been many successes but also some failures. The task ahead is always to learn from mistakes and to build on successes.

There have been courses organised which weren't needed and courses needed which weren't organised, however the referees administrator has continued to train develop and encourage referees in the region and the coaching administrator has made sure that there have been courses for all levels of coaching. I wish to thank both Brian Jones and 'Spud' Mosley for the work which they do.

We have made particular efforts to develop the game of volleyball in new areas such as N.Devon, Cornwall and Bath and to move forward in the Ladies. Game in particular. All of these with some success. The under 16 Championships were held at N. Devon Leisure Centre in March which was an encouragement to teams from that area to take part. In Bath, two tournaments were organised one mixed and one for ladies, both attracting the maximum number of teams. I would like to thank Junior Development Officer, Sue Sessions, Dennis Rimmer and Phil Millard for the work that they have put in coaching and organising in these areas.

1983 is Ladies Volleyball Development year and a bonus here in the South West was the staging of a pool of the Ladies Spring Cup which gave us the opportunity to see some of the top Ladies International teams in action and feel inspired to go back to our clubs and make greater achievements.

In spite of a few problems the competitions in the region have been well organised by Paul M ss with record-breaking numbers entering both Men's and Ladies Championships, including teams from both Jersey and Guernsey. It was a pleasure to meet and play against these teams.

We have made steps forward with player registration but still not with total success. It is important to the region that all players are registered with the EVA and we have been playing a part in trying to make this easier and cheaper for local league players. I hope now that these players will do their part in making things easier for us.

All events, courses, development and meetings in the region have as always been co-ordinated by secretary, Ron Richards, without whose untiring efforts we would not be the biggest and best region of the EVA. My thanks to Ron, to treasurer Jeff Brehaut and the many organisers, coaches, referees throughout the region who keep us all playing volleyball.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

It is pleasing to note a growth in our membership - our figures for registration and affiliations are as follows:-

We continue to be the largest of the EVA Regions - both in the number of clubs and players.

Unfortunately this season has seen many of the SW Executive meetings dogged by arguments over the affiliation and registration issue and I hope that the proposals before the EVA AGM on local league registrations will be passed and thus bring back harmony to our meetings.

On the domestic scene our game has continued to improve and expand. New leagues have developed in N. Devon and Cornwall and the existing local leagues have continued their improvements.

On the international side we were delighted to see Speedwell play again in the European Cup - to lose by one set after an exciting match in Bath. I wish them well for the 1983 European Cup and congratulate them on winning another National League title.

The Womens Spring Cup brought some excellent volleyball to Bath and the teams went away delighted with the hospitality and organisation. It was such a pity that the crowds were so small - why did so few volleyballers turn up to watch the matches? On the positive side we do seem at long last to have established local volleyball in Bath.

The television coverage of the Spring Cup should provide us with an opportunity to expand - but we can only take advantage if our clubs and associations provide local publicity and set up beginners sessions and tournaments - what are you doing to help the growth of our game.

I would like to thank all those people who have worked so hard this season for volleyball in the South West - often giving up a great deal of their time I hope we can find more volunteers to help share the burden of coaching, refereeing and creanising.

Also money should be available for developing sreas and we kust put in the effort to increase club and player registrations as growth in volleyball is very important especially in the South West.

I look forward to 1983/84 and hope that we can continue our expansion and grow a lot more stronger.

This, coupled with the present system of administration of the League and the distribution geographically of teams within the region have convinced me that changes will have to be made.

As yet the exact nature of the changes to the league structure are interminable as all entries to the league are not in. I do feel sure the demand for the Open Leagues may well force us to split into North/South Leagues with top teams coming from each area to playoff for finals. A more reliable match confirmation/default system will have to be implimented too.

At the end of the day we did manage to produce a League Table - well done to Abergavenny, Cardiff Volts Ladies and Weymouth Rembrandt.

In the Cup Competition again a hectic days play with marches played atmost non-stop from 10.00 am to 7.00 pm. A record num br of teams took part and it would have been difficult to have had more teams in the competition and still have called each match a competition. At the close of the days play lack of time forced one Mens Semi-final to be stopped short of a deninite result

putting me on the spot. But as agreed at the start of play by all teams in the final matches, the aggregate score made the decision for me. Apart from this, well done to the finalists and well done to all teams taking part especially our friends from the Channel Islands.

A very last thank you to the Club Secretaries for a job well done in the face of much adversity.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT OFFICERS REPORT

At last I am able to write a report that shows that some people are working to develop the sport in schools and youth clubs. There have been several developments this year in areas like North Devon, Cornwall and Bath. The National bodies, the E.V.A. and E.S.V.A. have both produced schemes which should help us to promote the sport namely the Award Scheme and the Mini Volleyball campaign. We were able to run our Junior Championships this year with 12 teams in the UI6 competition and 7 teams in the U 20 competition.

The U 16 Championships were held at the North Devon Leisure Centre Barnstaple. There were 4 girls teams and 8 boys teams entered. This year there was an Open Competition and we welcomed Purbrook School Portsmouth to this competition for the first time. Also competing for the first time were local school teams. Most of the developments in the Barnstaple area are a result of the work of Denis Rimmer who has done a great deal to promote our sport. He also did most of the organisation of the U 16 tournament and with his club members helped with the running of the competition on the day. The results were as follows.

Girls (Open) 1st Purbrook School Portsmouth 2nd St George School Bristol 3rd Priory School Weston. (Closed) 1st St George School Bristol 2nd Priory School Weston 3rd Pilton School Barnstaple. Boys (Open) 1st Purbrook Portsmouth 2nd Poole Thumpers Poole 3rd Saints Weymouth (Closed) 1st Poole Thumpers 2nd Saints Weymouth 3rd Priory Weston.

The U 20 Championships were held (Just) at the Christie Miller Sports Cemtre Melksham. There were 7 entries, not enough to cover the eventual cost of the hall. The results were as follows:

I hope that next year we at least get enough entries to cover our costs and that teams get their entries in on time.

Other developments in the region this year are as follows :-

A. Mini Volleyball

We hace 3 pilot areas in the region which are being used to assess the viability of a major national campaign. The areas are (i) Cornwall under the guidance of Tom Fisher Helston School.

(ii) Bristol co-ordinator Lindy Morrison. St. George School

(iii) Poole, organiser Geoff Allan.

The hope is that by developing the small-sided game especially in junior and middle schools we will encourage the youngsters to stay with the game as they grow up. Also it is easier to promote with P.E. teachers as it uses a smaller court size, and is less complex than the 6 side game.

B. Bath Development

As Bath was one of the venues for the Spring Cup Preliminary Rounds it was felt the time was tipe for a big push in this region. Despite being the home venue for Speedwell Rucanor there has been remarkably little development in the town. Under the guidance of Ron Richards and Wilma Kelman a small but healthy schools league has grown. A lot of thanks are due also to Phil Millard of St. Marks School Bath who has done most of the hard slogging groundwork.

North Gloucestershire

The Association hold irregular meetings mormally attended by most association officials and representatives from each club affiliated to the association.

STROUD AND DISTRICT VOLLEYBALL LEAGUE

The 1982/83 season started with nine teams split into two divisions, based on previous performances and newcomers to the league. The Stroud League started the season with a net loss of three teams, compared with the previous season but we were pleased to have Club 16, Cheltenham YMCA and Nuclear as new teams.

By the end of the first half of the season Club I6 and Cheltenham YMCA had gained promotion to the first division, at the expense of S.D.C and Batemans dropping down.

The emergance of Glos Fire Service as the most dominate team in the league and not Status was richly deserved by their much improved team performance. During the course of the season there were memorable clashes between the top three teams in the league, Glos Fire Service, Stratus and Cope Chat. The former finished ad winners of both leagues, played before Christmas and in the New Year.

Most teams and obviously those not sponsored or subsidised, have found the cost of playing their volleyball has escalated due to increased court and administration changes, and the burden of EVA Support. In an effort to cut travelling costs especially most of the seasons fixtures were played on a triangular basis, which worked reasonably well.

The open tournament held on Sunday 24th April saw teams from both Gloucestershire Leagues competing on two courts in Stratford Park Leisure Centre, Stroud. It was an exhausting and long (although not long enough!) day for all 'those concerned, and it was disappointing in many respects we couldnot find the time to play the final This small matter(') has still to be resolved between Doubleview and Glos Fire Service.

We were pleased to be able to host the S.W. Finals on June 5th although it was unexpected. The Leagues AGM will be held on June 17th preceded by an interleague representative match between North Glos and Stroud League. The match will be at 6.00 pm (approx) and AGM at i.15 pm - all will be welcome.
