

t am pleased to report the continuation of the sponsorship of the association by Girobank. Their agreement to take up the option of the second and third years of the agreement was based on the success of the first years organisation and publicity.

The sponsorship has allowed the S.W. to further improve the quality of the publications: the comprehensive handbook sent to all clubs, the quarterly newsletter supplied to each affiliated player and the entry booklets, posters etc.

League volleyball has flourished, with three divisions in the regional league involving 30 teams (7 up on last season). The local areas of Gloucestershire, Avon, Woodspring, Wiltshire, Poole, Weymouth.N.Devon, Plymouth and Cornwall have strong local leagues which continue to provide Improved teams to move through into regional league.

SWVA has expressed to the EVA competitions Commission its concern that there is still no formal qualification structure for promotion from regional to national league. This we feel is an urgent need.

Two local leagues are not mentioned above - these areas are Guernsey and Jersey which both have thriving local leagues. Beeches from Jersey took part with much success in the Kestours Cup, this season.

I am sorry to report that at the time of writing affiliations have not reached last seasonslevels. This is due mainly to the problems association with the late affiliation of those boadies that block affiliate. We are however also concerned at the slow rate of growth, in the number of open, active volleyball

A successful development this season has been the establishment of the SW Development Centre funded by the SW Sports Council, Girobank, an EVA grant and by SWA. It has provided top national coaches for a days coaching in local areas to the benefit of players who would not normally be able to receive such coaching Courses have been arranged in Cornwall, N Devon, Plymouth, Wiltshire, Woodspring (Avon) and a regional ladies course. The invited coaches have been Dave Joy, Steve Nuth, Steve Spooner, Jefferson Williams and Barry Swann.

Unfortenately the region has not organised many coaching award courses in the past year - partly due to the restructuring of the awards but also due to an unwillingness of players to become qualified coaches. On this we will have to work hard.

One of the most fruitful methods that the association has found to increase the involvement and quality of its member teams is to Senior Champions, Ladies Introductory Tournament Inter-League Champions. In addition we are grateful to clubs and local areas for thir organisation of open tournaments which we hope teams from other areas will join.

The SW Senior Championships was a great success and compliments are due to the local organising committee from Woodspring Volleyball Association for the way in which the event ran so smoothly.

Unfortunately the SW Junior Championships - the mini volley and the U.17 and UI9 were all cancelled due to lack of entries. This is a pity in a region that was so proud of junior structure. Part of the problem I feel is the lack of a Junior Development Officer - if there is anyone prepared to take on this vital role- please come along to the AGM and volunteer.

Having been critical of the junior competitions, I would like to congratulate the Regional Junior Squad coaches, Gill Harrison, Mandy Hooper, Barry Swann and; Lyn and Geoff Allen. The U.17 boys took the national junior title and while the others did not win trophies they drew lots of priase for their effort and spirit at the national championships at Nottingham.

Finally I would like to express my thanks to all the administrators that make volleyball and volleyball development possible- in particular my fellow bas SW officers and all the Area Secretaties. publications: the empranensive handbook sent to all clubs, the quarterly.

JUNIOR : SQUADS REPORT

After a slow response from junior players in the South West the squads gradually began to take shape after Christmas.

One of the main aims of the squads is to expose young players to top level coaching. Therefore its pleasing to see players from all over the South West attending training sessions.

From the training sessions 4 teams were selected to represent the South West at the Inter Regional Junior Championships at Nottingham in April. A decision was made to take young (tall!) Under 17 teams which will hopefully play together for the next 2 - 3 years.

Once again Lynne and Geoff Allen did an excellent job in preparing the Mens teams with the Under 19's finishing 5th and the Under 17's winning the cadet event. The ladies squads flourished under the guidance of Barry Swann with the Under 19 team coached by Mandy Hooper finishing a creditable 4th. A very; young Under 17 team took 7th place. The ladies teams benifited from the help of team managers Terry Brooke and Lindy Morrison.

It is important to note that the squads are truly representative with players coming together from pockets of volleyball all over the South West.

The main problem threatening the development of the squads is - finance. It cost £1000 to send the teams to the Regional Championships. That is solely for travel and accommodation over the weekend. CORNWALL VOLLEYBALL ASSOCIATION

ANNUAL REPORT 1987/88

At the end of its 7th year the Cornwall Association has consolidated the progress made in the previous six years of its's existence.

The highlight for the players was the two day visit to the county of Barry Swann who gave a splendid session for the men on the first day, the fruits of which are already being seen on the court. The second day was for ladies improvement and despite a hitch in the booking arrangements (not the fault of the organisers), an excellent day was enjoyed by the Cornish players and some from Plymouth who joined us for the day. Barry's organisational skills in a less than perfect hall were an object lesson to us all on how to keep players busy, working and happy.

In the league season just completed, the two Services sides have dominated the competition with Guldrose proving easy winners despite not always having their strongest team available. They dropped only 5 sets during the season. St.Mawgan ended in a comfortable second position without really havint threatened Coldrose supremacy. Helston, having lost 3 of their starting 6 at Christmas had to be content with third place. Behind them level on points were the two most improved sides in the first division, Countryman A and Fire Service, with some honing of technique and the addition of taller players to contest the centre of the net in attack and defence these teams must surely be looking for honour next season.

The Second division of the league was won for the second year in succession by Countryman B, who were never really threatened. Cornwall College came a creditable second and surprised many people by their competitiveness. Most excisiting of all was the presence of Folkuth Spikers in third place. A new team this season, their appearance in a tournament in November was welcome evidence of interest in the East of the County but their playing standard indicated that much needed to be done. Must have been done, and their playing standard in recent weeks has been a revelation. Roland Mogg is to be congratulated on the immense amount of time and energy he has invested in this tremendous achievement. Thie organisation and enthusiasm provide an example which all would do well to follow.

On the regional scene, Helston nentered men's and women's teams in the Regional Leagues, with the women having a very successful season while the men ha ve adjusted to the demand of the Premier League and rest in the middle of the table. Culdrose have been playing in the Plymouth League and have been as domenant there as in the Cornwall League. It is intended to enter a men's composite team in the Regional League next season which will further improve standards among the feeder clubs. It is hoped that ladies hoping to experience volleyball at the higher level will form a composite team with Helston Ladies so that the strongest side can be entered.

An official's award course was organised and successful candidates emerged. Another course is planned for June and it is hoped that every club will persuade members to take the course and provide a larger pool of qualified officials.

A very successful one day tournament was sponsored by Kerrier Sports Council at Can Brea Leisure Centre in November. This was won by Helston with St.Mawgan as runners up. The first set in this final was described as the most exciting volleyball played in Cornwall to date. The Plate Final was won by Countryman B who defeate- Helston B.

Volleyball is now established in both Leisure Centres and this must increase interest in the sport.

A Beach Tournament was organised in July with a good turnout, but an unseasonal Gale meant that local rules had to be instituted: e.g. serve was carried out from the 3 metre line when facing the gale. Have you ever played volleyball with A Force 9 bully ki cking sand in your face? A beach tournament is planned for this summer on a more sheltered beach.

Those clubs from the Regional leagues which we have welcomed down here will know just how remote we are. It is worth pointing out that the bulk of the volleyball played in Cornwall is played in Kerrier District which with a population of 52,000 stretched from cost to cost and is a mere 20 miles from Lands End. How many other areas of this population size can boast 13 active and competitive teams.

With courses organised, leagues vitrant and a welcome surge of interest from the schools, volleyball in Cornwa-l is set for a major expansion in the next few years.

National League

Out National League teams have had mixed fortunes over the last year. After a poor start. W.H. Whites rallied to finish 8th in Division I, their highest ever league position. However, Atlas Wessex lost the Division I place they did so well to attain last seas, finishing on the same points total as Polonia but being relegated on set difference. At has Wessex Ladies were promoted to Division I after finishing 2nd to Portsmouth Scorpions and their Mens second team were promoted to Division IV South.

Local Competitions.

Atlas Wessex dominated Division I of the Local League, filling the top four positions. The two clubs new to the league this season, Winfrith and Reborn, did well in Division II, finishing 1st and 4th respectively. Purbeck were runners-up in his division. Ferndown were Division II winners, with Guys Marsh second. The K.O. Cup was won by Atlas Wessex, beating W.H. White 3-0 in the final. Winfrith took the Division III Cup Final. Two new competitions were introduced this season, born of which proved sufficiently popular to organise on a regular basis (sponsorship is to be sought for both events). The Handicap Cup, where teams received a handicap of up to 12 points per set based on League position, turned up some entertaining matches, with two Atlas Wessex teams contesting the final. However, the top 3 teams in Division I and the Division II winners reached the semi finals, suggesting that the handicaps were not sufficiently severe. In response to the South West Sports Council's desire to promote Ladies wolleyball, a mini-tournament was run at the end of the season. Atlas Wesse won, with Splitz second but the bebefits of this competition may be yet to come, With the hope of attractiny other ladies teams into the league and the possible future inauguration of either a Ladies League or a Mixed League.

Coaching and Refereeing

In January a development Centre for U.17 and U.19 boys was run at Poole by Geoff Allen. It is hoped to hold a coaching session for ladies, both beginners and experienced players, before the start of next season.

Paul Pinhorne was awarded Grade I refereeing status and Phil Francis Grade II status. A referees course was held at Poole in September, run by Brian Jones, at which there were 9 successful candidates at Grade IV.

Area Status

Our original application for Area Status apparently went astray in the post. Our second attempt was made just before we were notified of the change of address of the EVA'S administrative offices and has also gone missing. We hope that the saying "Third time lucky" holds true and that the current submission is successful. Meanwhile the EVA recognises Poole as holding Category B Status whereby Area Status has been approved pending a further submission of relevant papers.

This season the Wiltshire area ran a mens league of 9 teams and for the first time a ladies league of 5 teams. Again this year Swindon had a mens team in National League Division 3 and a ladies team in the South West League.

This season has been our busiest yet with the first event on the calendar being two'come and try' sessions which were a great success receiving publicity in the local press and on local radio. 25 new faces turned up to the sesions held at Wootton Bassett over the two weeks.

The 'Rec' the new Highworth Sports Centre, together with local players from our Thames Water team, ran 4 taster sessions to test the response in the area.

We plan to run more of these in the future and in particular a junior taster day which, if successful, will be followed by weekly training.

In February we had a grade 4 referee course with 24 participants, most from our local teams with a few new faces from a local sports centre as well.

In March we held a development centre for nation/regional league standard men with Steve Nuth the Speedwell coach as our coach for the day. The course was attended by 17 players who all benefitted from the expert coaching and I hope the team coaches, or potential team coaches, learned a great deal on ho to coach their teams. We plan to run another course for our ladies and local league standard men in the near future.

In April we had our End of Season County Cup Tournament which proved to be an exciting and competitive day with Swindon winning the final in a hard fought match against Wootton Bassett (Cable) 2-1. This was followed later in the week by our first Presentation Evening including a hot supper and disco. Tracey Barker (Swindon) received the ladies players player of the year award and a stunned Les Symons (Wootton Bassett) the mens award. With almost 100 people attending this was a successful and very enjoyable venture.

This year we entered a mens, and for the first time a ladies team in the County Championships at Leeds which proved to be a very enjoyable weekend.

In June we will be running a county schools tournament, with the help of EVA grant aid received, at Wroughton Ridgeway School.
